Part 3 – <u>Debate and Discussion</u>

You will hear a debate and discussion. Read the questions and answers on your examination paper for both the debate and discussion. You have two minutes to read them.

Listen to the <u>Debate</u>. You will hear it twice. Answer the questions. Then you have two minutes to check the answers.

Record the debate.

We are going to have a debate about GM Food - genetically modified food. With me are Maria Johnson and Robert Potter. Maria and Robert - what are GM Foods?

Maria: Genetically modified foods, or GM foods, are foods that have been modified using biotechnology. Most known GM foods are pineapples, strawberries and potatoes. GM foods are made to last longer, have more nutrients, taste better and also the crops will have a higher quantity when harvested.

Robert: Did you know that rats tested in a private lab in 2008 and fed GM foods showed heart blockage, cancer and died at an earlier age than those who were fed organic foods?

Maria: Genetically modified foods have been tested over and over again. The tests that showed rats getting cancer and tumours were frauds. The lab showed false information. Growing GM foods is a good chance to increase food production, because they have defences against bugs already built in. It also reduces the amount of chemicals needed on crops. Another bonus is the one chemical they do use doesn't run off into water and breaks down quickly.

Robert: But don't you think it's a horrible thing to inject our foods with chemicals and other modifications? It's absolutely stupid to think that people don't want to know what they are feeding their family. I live in a house of five and I only shop at the local Farmers Market so that I know what I'm putting on my family's table at dinner.

Maria: Though many people think that there is too much toxicity in GM foods, the toxicity is actually only strong enough to kill pests. It is actually completely harmless to mammals. If GM foods are used, then the world will be healthier place. GM foods can be very nutritional and can have a much larger yield than un-altered crops. This is especially helpful in places like Africa where there isn't good soil to grow the necessary crops to sustain themselves.

Robert: This is something we will never agree on, Maria. Unless you buy food that says 100% Organic on the front of it, there is a good chance that it was made by scientists, not grown by farmers.

Part 3 - <u>Discussion</u>

Sam - Yes I do. I make it a point to recycle as much as I can within my home and workplace. Recycling helps save the environment through reusing materials. We don't have as much waste and are able to save space on our own land. Recycling is necessary and I have always believed that it should be a requirement for everyone.

In your opinion how important is recycling?

Sam - Recycling is crucial to the survival of our planet. Recycling helps us do that by reducing the amount of waste we put out. In doing this we help the planet keep the resources it needs to sustain life. Recycling is a necessary part of all of this and it is heartening to see so many people getting in on it.

And can you recycle everywhere, Jemma?

Jemma - Unfortunately, recycling is not possible everywhere. This is because recycling bins are not available everywhere you go. With the lack of bins it is impossible to recycle unless you take your rubbish home to do so. When I have had a lot of recyclable materials and nowhere to put them I have taken them home to ensure they make it somewhere to be reused but sometimes it's just impossible.

So how can we encourage more people to recycle?

Jemma - I think that it is easy for people to recycle in their homes because the bins are readily available and you just put them out once every two weeks. The real challenge is finding ways to encourage people to recycle in public.

And my final question, can more be done to recycle, Susan?

Susan: There is always an opportunity to increase recycling efforts. We need to keep reusing materials to conserve the Earth. The more that it's done, the better our Earth can be. By getting more information out there we can cause a change in the way that people react to the recycling message.
